REGISTRATION & FEES

Only BSA registered Scouts may attend Summer Camp

FEES:

The \$50.00 unit reservation fee and \$15.00 reservation fee per participant are due with the reservation form to hold a site. This is non-refundable.

This money will be applied toward your total camp fees unless you choose to leave it for next years reservation.

In-Council— Youth

Before April 16—\$170.00 After April 16—\$200.00

Out of Council— Youth

Before April 16—\$180.00 After April 16—\$210.00

High Adventure— Youth or Adult

Before April 16—\$225.00 After April 16—\$275.00

All Leaders in Base Camp—\$115.00

(In council leaders attending any work weekend will receive \$25.00 in Camp Bucks (One per year, non-transferable)

Proof of unit liability insurance is required at check-in.

NEW SCOUT OR A SCOUT WHO TRANSFERRED FROM WEBELOS:

A boy or Webelos, who joins the troop after April 16, is eligible for the Before April 16 camp fee no matter when he registers for camp.

ADDITIONAL OPTION—Dining Hall offered to first 100 signed up each week. Additional fee of \$35.00 per person will be due with registration.

PLAN FOR NEXT YEAR

Plan to attend SPSR next summer. Sign up for your favorite week and campsite while at camp. A campsite deposit is due when you sign up.

REFUND POLICY

1. The \$50.00 unit reservation fee and \$15.00 reservation fee per participant is non-refundable.
2. Scout and leader fees are transferable within your troop at any time.
3. The cancellation of an individual reservation that cannot be transferred within your troop will be subject to the following:
 - a. TWO WEEKS or more before DAY 1 of your scheduled week, 90% of fees (less \$15.00 deposit) will be refunded.
 - b. LESS THAN TWO WEEKS before DAY 1 of your scheduled week, No refund is available unless there has been a medical emergency .

The programs and activities of the Spanish Peaks Scout Ranch are available to all with out regard to race, color, national origin, religion, age, sex, or handicap.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Mail should not be sent to Scouts after Tuesday, it will not be received until after they have departed camp and will be returned to sender. Please put return address on all mail, otherwise it cannot be returned.

CHAPEL SERVICES

A short, nondenominational service will be conducted on Tuesday evening. Catholic services will be available in Walsenburg and we will have the times for mass posted at the Camp Office.

FIRST AID

Qualified adults at the Health Lodge will handle First Aid. Any injury must be reported and treated there. If any injury requires treatment at the hospital, an adult leader will be asked to accompany the First Aid officer.

TROOP SITES

You will find a latrine with wash stand, drinking fountain (except for camp-site 11), and running water. A flagpole and dishwater sump is standard equipment.

PATROL SITES

Each troop site is divided into patrol sites. Each site includes 7' X 9' wall tents with platforms for two people, picnic table with benches, dining fly, fire extinguisher and fire barrel. **Troops will be assessed for damages if tents receive abuse beyond normal wear during your stay in camp.** A pack frame with a food carrier basket will be issued with the first meal. Plan to supply your own cots.

UNIFORM IN CAMP

The Scout summer uniform (Class "A") is suggested for adults and Scouts. You are expected to have the entire troop in Class "A" uniform at camp-wide meals, campfires, chapel, Order of the Arrow callout and special events.

LOST AND FOUND

The lost and found will be maintained at the Camp office. Money and other valuables should be turned in at the Camp office.

PERSONAL VEHICLES

All troop vehicles are to be parked in the parking lot, not in campsites. SPSR vehicles will move gear to campsites. Plan to observe the 5 mph speed limit throughout camp! **NO PERSONAL VEHICLE WILL BE ALLOWED IN THE CAMPSITES.** Exception: Vehicle with Handicap tags or stickers.

CAMP-WIDE MEALS

Meals on Sunday evening, Friday evening and Saturday morning will be served at the commissary. Please bring your own eating utensils.

PATROL COOKING

SPSR is a patrol cooking camp. Scouts in the Patrol Sites will cook most meals. Food will be issued with cooking instructions prior to each meal. The actual menu may change from time to time. SPSR will try to post the menu 24 hours in advance.

DINING HALL SERVICE

Provided at an extra cost for up to 100 campers per week.

TRADING POST

Coffee mugs, patches, handicraft items, pop, candy, ice cream, pizza, nachos, burritos, knives, t-shirts and many other items will be available for your purchase. Hours: 8:30 am—9:30 pm.

CHECK-IN

Scouts are to arrive at camp for check-in between 2:00 pm and 4:00 pm (MDT) on Sunday. Prior arrangements can be made to check-in earlier.

CHECKOUT

Please have transportation available for your troop at camp on Saturday morning. Checkout between 7:00 am and 9:30 am (MDT). Arrangements can be made for earlier checkout. Your Staff Guide will assist your troop during checkout.

LEAVING CAMP DURING WEEK

If it is necessary to leave camp during the week, scouts or leaders, please check out with the Camp Director at the Camp Office. In an emergency it may be necessary to know the location of all campers.

TELEPHONE SERVICE

The SPSR telephone number is (719) 738-3036. Please limit conversation to 5 minutes. The telephone is located at the Camp Office. Emergency calls must be placed person to person to the Scout. Please have the Scout's Name and Troop Number. We will locate his Scout leader promptly and he will be able to return the call in a short time. Scouts may call home "Collect" or "Credit Card" only if accompanied by a unit leader.

HEAD COUNT FOR CAMPERS

We suggest a head count at each meal and at bedtime. It is also suggested that all Scouts "sign-out" upon leaving the campsite. A form could be put on the Troop bulletin board. If you are short a Scout and cannot account for his absence, notify the Camp Director immediately.

VISITOR MEALS

Parents and guests are always welcome to join their troop for meals. The cost is \$5.00 per person, payable at the camp office at check-in. Please notify the Camp Director of last minute changes, 24 hours prior to the meal.

CAMP STAFF

The SPSR Staff will be hired during the months of November—December. A Scout must be 14 years of age to apply. Please urge your older and more qualified Scouts to apply for a staff position. Applications are available at the Council Service Center and at the camp office.

TAPS (10:00 pm)

A Scout is courteous. Scouts should respect people trying to sleep after TAPS. All Scouts should be restricted to their campsite at this time.

SCOUT REGISTRATION

All Scouts must be registered with the Boy Scouts of America before attending camp. The Camp Director will register any Scout not registered and the unit account will be billed.

FIRES

(BE PREPARED for the possibility of a FIRE BAN, plan to bring alternative cooking equipment.) Always use the stoves provided in the campsites for any fires you build. Fires built on the ground can ignite a tree root that can smolder until it ends up in the tree trunk and the fire breaks out. Fire rings are available upon request for a more traditional ground fire.

CAMPSITES CLEAN-UP

It is the responsibility of all troops to leave their campsite cleaner than they found it. It is not the responsibility of the Camp Staff to keep SPSR clean. In the evening it is recommended that each unit remove all trash to the designated location. There are animals around SPSR, including bears, raccoons, etc. The cleanliness of your campsite is very important to the safety of all campers attending SPSR. Consult the staff on the rigging of bear bags.

PROVISIONAL CAMPING AT SPSR

Provisional Camping is available to Scouts who wish to attend camp but are unable to attend with your troop during the regular stay or if you have Scouts who wish to stay an additional week. No additional fee will be added to the regular weekly charge for Scouts that attend a Provisional Camp.

PROGRAM EXPENSES

Scouts participating in the merit badge program should be prepared with a merit badge pamphlet for each merit badge he plans to earn. SPSR does not use the official BSA Merit Badge "Blue Card" . If your council requires the cards please bring them with you and we will gladly fill them out for your unit. In addition, he should bring between \$10.00—\$25.00 for activity expenses. ALL PROGRAM EXPENSES ARE SUBJECT TO CHANGE. WE WILL DO EVERYTHING POSSIBLE TO KEEP COST LOW!

HIGH ADVENTURE PROGRAMS

At Spanish Peaks Scout Ranch our High Adventure Program include some of the most strenuous backpacking treks you can imagine. We will guide you on hikes of 1-5 days. To the summits of the three major Peaks in our area, East Spanish Peak (12,600+ ft), West Spanish Peak (13,600+ ft), and Trinchera Peak (13,000+ ft).

We also have a Rock Climbing program that is unequalled anywhere. There is only one other area in the World where you can experience the dikes such as ours and that is in Siberia.

We also have a TRAIL BLAZER BACKPACKING program. This is geared toward youth (males) 13 and up; youth (females) 14 and up, and adults. First class rank or 12 days and nights of camping experience. Younger participants are allowed if a parent or mentor is also in the course.

We are planning to offer a Paintball activity at SPSR in 2010. We will have a course with several targets. Come check out your shooting accuracy. All equipment is provided. DO NOT BRING ANY PERSONAL PAINTBALL EQUIPMENT. You will need to bring extra money to purchase the supplies to participate (similar to shooting sports).

To increase their success rate in completing merit badges, Scouts should know the requirements and read the appropriate merit badge pamphlet before they arrive.

PARTIAL COMPLETIONS

Each Scout who completes only a portion of a merit badge will receive a partial completion report giving credit for those requirements he has completed.

MERIT BADGE COUNSELORS

Only adult members of the camp staff or other qualified adults will serve as merit badge counselors. Young people on the camp staff, under 21 years of age will be working as instructors. Their work is reviewed and certified by an area director who is over 21 years of age.

PROGRAM OPPORTUNITIES

FIRST CLASS TRAIL: This program has been specially designed to meet the needs of first year campers of Scouts who have not reached the rank of First Class. A Tenderfoot Scout completing this program can earn his Second Class and be well on his way to the rank of First Class.

HEALTH & SAFETY

THE STATE OF COLORADO REQUIRES A BI-YEARLY PHYSICAL, WITHIN THE LAST 24 MONTHS, FOR ALL CAMP PARTICIPANTS UNDER 40 YEARS OF AGE (YOUTH, ADULT & STAFF). ALL PARTICIPANTS OVER 40 MUST HAVE ONE WITHIN 12 MONTHS. THERE CAN BE NO EXCEPTIONS: ANY PARTICIPANT WITHOUT A PHYSICAL HAS THE OPTION OF GOING TO WALSENBURG AND PAYING TO GET A PHYSICAL OR RETURN HOME. ALL MEDICAL FORMS REQUIRE A DOCTOR'S SIGNATURE. Please make copies of the SPSR forms included with your leaders packet that will be sent out in a separate mailing. OR visit the website: www.spanishpeaksscouteranch.com and download a copy. Colorado requires a separate form from the BSA forms.

MEDICAL EXAMINATION

All people attending SPSR must turn in a signed medical examination form. Any Scout or leader under a doctor's care is required to notify their doctor concerning the course of treatment. All medication is to be stored with the health officer. Exceptions only with medical statement of doctor. Please make sure insurance number and policy name are included.

HEALTH OFFICER

A resident Health Officer will be available at all times. A medical recheck will be given upon arrival in camp to familiarize the Health Officer with each Scout/leader and their health history. The Health Officer handles most accidents and minor illnesses. Arrangements for treatment of more serious cases requiring a hospital visit have been made with Huerfano County Hospital in Walsenburg.

EMERGENCIES

Report all illnesses and injuries to the Health Officer. If the victim cannot be moved send two messengers to the Health Lodge with details including type of injury, identity of victim, exact time of accident and location.

CAMPSITE SAFETY

- Use axe yards and store equipment safely.
- Keep latrines, and tents clean.
- NO liquid fuels should be kept in campsite.
- Lanterns and stoves are to be used under adult supervision.
- NO flames in tents.
- Keep fire barrels filled with water.
- Vehicles are to remain in the parking lot, not in the campsite.

PERSONAL HEALTH & SAFETY

- Wear shoes at all times, no sandals, no running in camp.
- Use flashlight at night.
- NO knives larger than a 4-inch pocket knife allowed.
- NO sheath knives.
- NO guns of any kind.
- Scout and leaders should bathe daily.
- We encourage use of a full time buddy system.
- Drink lots of water during your stay at camp.

EMERGENCY PROCEDURES

1. The siren will sound continuously for 5 minutes, except at the emergency drill at the first of the week.
2. All leaders and Scouts move quickly to the front of the Health Lodge. Assemble in troop lines.
3. Leaders will take a count of the Scouts to see if any are missing. Bring troop rosters indicating where Scouts are scheduled to be. Report to Camp Director.
4. Leaders standby for planned actions.

ALTITUDE

Most people need a chance to get used to the higher altitude. If you or your Scouts feel *dizzy* or out of breath, **REST** and **DRINK WATER!** CAUTION: *Know Your Limitations, Don't Over Do It!*

SHOWER HOUSE

Hot showers are available for Scouts and leaders. Shower shorts or swim-suits are advisable for boys because this a group activity.

DISHWASHING

The Scoutmaster should pay careful attention to the dishwashing done in Patrol Sites. Make certain that the proper techniques are being used in washing and rinsing the dishes. Keep your dishwater **HOT!**

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES

The possession of alcoholic beverages is prohibited in any Boy Scout Camp. Any person unwilling to abide by this policy will be removed from camp.

DRUGS

The illegal use or possession of controlled substances is prohibited in any Boy Scout Camp. Any person unwilling to abide by this policy will be removed from camp and the authorities will be called.

SMOKING

Campers, because of fire danger and the role we play as models for youth, smoking will only be allowed at designated smoking areas in camp. We ask that you do not smoke at camp-wide gatherings such as campfires. **PLEASE, NO SMOKING ON THE TRAILS.** Deposit all cigarette butts in the containers provided, in the designated smoking areas, after they are completely out.

FIREWORKS

NO fireworks are permitted in any Boy Scout Camp.

LIQUID & LP FUELED APPLIANCES MUST COMPLY WITH ALL BSA POLICIES GOVERNING THEIR USE.

These appliances are to be fueled by Adults only.

NO FLAMES IN TENTS

Liquid or LP fueled lanterns and candle lanterns should never be used in tents. Do not use liquid fuels for fire starting. Solid fire starters can be just as effective.

EMPTY LIQUID OR LP FUEL CONTAINERS

Please turn any empty containers in to the ranger, these containers can be explosive. Please see that they are disposed of correctly. ***DO NOT PUT IN DRY TRASH!!!***

FIRE EXTINGUISHERS

There will be a fire extinguisher located at the latrine. If one is discharged, tell your Staff Host immediately, so it can be replaced.

REMOVAL OF ASHES FROM CAMPSITES

We ask that all wood ashes are emptied directly into the ash barrel, and **NO** ashes or partially burned wood should be scattered.

LITTER

Troops are asked to clean their campsites and trails in the general area daily. The eleventh point of the Scout Law says a Scout is Clean. Litter can attract animals that are better off fending for themselves. Litter can ruin your Scout Camp. Encourage your troop to put litter in its place and learn a good outdoor habit. Be sure there is no food in the campsite after dark!

NO PETS ALLOWED!!

Leave your pets at home! You are only away at camp for 1 week.

NOTE TO PARENTS

This is a suggested list. Items that are most important for your son's week-long stay are clothing, sleeping bag and eating utensils. Your son will be sleeping in tents with wooden platforms. He should have an air mattress , foam pad or cot. PLEASE LABEL ITEMS WITH YOUR SON'S NAME, ADDRESS AND TROOP NUMBER.

The weather can turn cool and wet. Be sure to bring a winter sweater or jacket. This warm clothing is very important and can make a difference in how enjoyable a week your son will have at SPSR. Temperatures can range from the 80's during the day to mid-30's at night.

EQUIPMENT CHECKLISTS

TROOP EQUIPMENT:

CAMP LOCATION (8,400 ft)

Spanish Peaks Scout Ranch is located 16 miles Southwest of Walsenburg, Colorado (6,167 ft).

From Walsenburg take US Highway 160 West to the edge of town. Turn south onto a gravel road where you will cross a bridge and your first cattle guard continue 16 miles on County Road 340 (Bear Creek Road). Following County Road 340 for 16 miles, you will cross 11 cattle guards. Do not make any hard right or left turns at Y's in the road, but stay on County Road 340 it is marked! When you cross the 11th cattle guard, you will be in camp. Walsenburg is located about 65 miles south of Pueblo, CO, and about 40 miles north of the New Mexico State line. Spanish Peaks Scout Ranch is 16 miles Southwest of Walsenburg. The nearest major highway is Interstate 25 which runs North and South through the Eastern part of Colorado, from Trinidad, CO on the South to the Wyoming State Line on the North.

If passing through Western Kansas, our council has a camp (Mandan Training Center) available North of Dodge City, Kansas for a minimal fee.
